What will I do?

You'll be part of an extraordinary performance project with two renowned theatre companies (whose shows have been in the West End, National Theatre, New York and more) to perform alongside them in a bold new outdoor production. You'll join with up to 50 other young people to tell new stories through drama, dance, music, and expressive performance.

In the process, you'll develop new skills through fun, creative rehearsals throughout summer, and you'll also take part in activities in the autumn to become a local ambassador and change-maker in your community.

Who are we looking for?

We want to involve young people from all backgrounds, aged 11 to 22, based in London. Whether or not you have any performing experience, we are excited to meet and work with people who are: passionate, energised, generous, hardworking, open to new experiences, and want to make a difference.

From Here On is free to take part! The performances will take place in public spaces and be free for your friends and family to attend.

The project is open to all, and we are particularly excited to meet young people from refugee and asylum seeking backgrounds. Please note that basic English is needed to take part.

We are looking for two casts for From Here On, a Main Cast who will be part of all rehearsals and a Chorus who will only need to be part of some rehearsals - see these dates:

It will be fun and friendly, physical and creative - a chance to get a taste of how we tell stories, meet our professional performers, and learn more about the project. Following the workshops, we will select 35-50 young people to form our Main Cast and Chorus for the project.

What will happen at the recruitment workshop?

You'll meet members of the Gecko and Good Chance teams, and up to 25 other young people taking part in your workshop. The team will lead the group through a series of simple theatre/dance games and exercises, in which you'll have a chance to express yourself through movement and take part in creative drama exercises.

From the recruitment workshops, Gecko and Good Chance will decide which young people they would like to invite to take part. The Main Cast will be part of the whole performance, and the Chorus will need to attend fewer rehearsals and will likely only be part of the final section of the performance. We will choose our performers based on trying to achieve a range of ages, backgrounds and levels of performance experience across the whole of the two casts.

What will the rehearsals be like?

The rehearsals will take place over the summer and will prepare the cast of 35-50 young people to perform the piece.

Through the rehearsals, you will embody different characters and learn movement and drama sequences that will form part of our performance. You'll be nurtured in your performance style and skills, through this unique opportunity to work with professional performers. You'll discover more about the history of the Kindertransport and other stories of migration. And we hope you'll have a lot of fun and make new friends and connections that will last long beyond the project.

What will the performances be like?

The performances will be powerful pieces of physical theatre - focusing on movement to tell stories, rather than speech - with 35-50 young people performing alongside 10 professional Gecko performers.

The piece will move from the past through to the present. We will start by telling stories of children leaving Germany on the Kindertransport trains and boats. We will represent similar journeys that have taken place during the past 85 years. Our performance will end with the stories of young people seeking sanctuary today.

In London, the performances will take place outdoors at a central location around Liverpool Street Station, and will be open for anyone from the public to attend. Performances will happen four times a day on Friday 6th September and Sunday 8th September.
